

The Apple Tree: From Flowers to Fruit to Cider Grade Levels: K-1 & 2-3

The crisp days of fall are time for cider making. Using apples we have picked from Hildene's trees, students wash and press the fruit into sweet cider. After the cider has been pasteurized, students sample the delicious juice. To appreciate the development of apple fruit, students explore the essential role of pollinators and dissect a simple flower to discover how its parts contribute to the process of pollination. Through investigation and pantomime, the life cycle of the apple tree, the function of its parts and how it changes through the seasons will also be examined.
